### 5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

### A. REGULAR MEETING OF MAY 21, 2018

It was moved by Lewis, supported by Caviston, to approve the minutes of the regular board meeting of May 21, 2018.

#### **6. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION**

- John Nydam, a citizen of the township, thanked the board for fixing Prospect Road. He also discussed enforcing seasonal weight restrictions for trucking companies that drive the roads. He thinks if a restriction is not enforced that Prospect Road will be destroyed in 2 to 3 years.
- He also commented on the gypsy moth infestation this year. He believes this is the third year of gypsy moths overrunning the area.

#### 7. PRESENTATIONS AND PUBLIC HEARINGS

- A. Benjamin Carlisle, LEED, AICP, Principal with Carlisle | Wortman Associates, Inc., submitted their proposed scope of planning services to the board. The township has parted was with Pennington Planners and needed to acquire a new firm for planning services.
  - Carlisle | Wortman Associates, Inc. represent about 80 communities in the state. They have 20 planners on staff. Benjamin Carlisle will be the day to day contact for the township.
- B. Ken Palka of Pfeffer, Hanniford and Palka, CPA's presented the township's FY 2017 Audit:
  - Total General Fund expenditures exceeded revenues by \$99,849.00 due to spending on road repair. Total expenditures in the Fire Fund exceeded revenues by \$41,034.00 and Law Fund expenditures exceeded revenues by \$20,745.00. There was a surplus on all other funds of \$115,434.00. All combined there was a small decrees in the fund balance of \$44,044.00.
  - The Water and Sewer Fund had a small surplus of \$80,083.00.
  - The General Fund combined with the Parks and Recreation Fund, due to the General Fund supporting the Parks and Recreation Fund, had a small loss of \$97,699.00.
  - Overall operating revenue was \$779,512.00.
  - Total capital assets are \$15,430,906.00.
  - Pie Chart 1 The chart shows 50% of the townships revenue comes from the state at \$1,123,216.000. The second largest source of revenue comes from taxes in the amount of \$523,881.00.
  - Graph 2 Shows a comparison of the Fund Balance from 1994-2017. The Fund Balance was lower is 2017 due to road repairs.
  - Graph 3 Shows a comparison of the Utility Fund Balance from 1995-2017. Over the years revenues have exceeded expenditures.
  - Pie Chart 2 Shows the General Fund Fund Balance total of \$1,774,713.00 with \$1,704,002.00 being undesignated.
  - Pie chart 3 Shows the Parks Fund with a balance of \$577,692.00 with \$184,025.00 being undesignated and \$383,157.00 going towards building reserves.
  - Pie Chart 4 Shows the Fire Fund with a balance of \$2,550,713.00 with \$1,491,018.00 being undesignated.
  - Pie Chart 5 Shows the Building Fund with a balance of \$773,284.00.
  - Pie Chart 6 Shows the Water and Sewer Fund with total restricted cash and cash equivalents of \$3,584,339.00 included in that is a capital reserve of \$1,971,180.00.

• Pie Chart 7 - Shows the Law Fund with a balance of \$257,155.00.

It was moved by McKinney, supported by Lewis, to receive and accept the findings of the Charter Township of Superior FY2017 Audit Report as presented.

The audit will be submitted to the state on Tuesday.

#### A. SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Schwartz reported on the following:

- The township was awarded \$10,000.00 from Community Tourism Action Plan (CTAP) for the Dixboro Village Green pavilion.
- Utilizing Right-of-Way Monies, Lucas Nursery will be installing 16 pear trees in the right-of-way on Geddes from Andover to Harris. The total cost will be around \$2500.00.
- No update on Salem Township's Gotfredson sewer plans. The supervisor did received all the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) documents regarding the project.
- The Dixboro House plans have been approved by the township. They still have some work to do with the Washtenaw County Road Commission and the Washtenaw County Water Resources Commission. Their goal is to have work completed by the end of the year.
- There was a phone conference two weeks ago with the Peninsular Dam working group regarding the removal of the Peninsular Dam. The township has about 7 residents who have houses behind the dam and hold riparian rights on the pond. They are adamantly opposed to the removal of the dam. The dam is owned by the City of Ypsilanti and the township does not have a say in what happens to the dam. The City of Ypsilanti has funding for removal of the dam not for repair. The township is working to ensure that the residents do not lose their riparian rights.
- The administrative staff met today with Ypsilanti District Library (YDL) and the library's architects regarding the plans for the Superior Township branch of the Ypsilanti District Library. If the library millage passes in November the YDL is committing all of its reserves to the new library. The funds generated by the millage would go towards operations for the future.
- The supervisor discussed increasing compensation to attract employees to the township. He also discussed upgrading resources in order for the township to better service the community by way of transitioning the township's files to a digital format.
